










Philippians 2:6-7




As if the incarnation itself is not mind-bending enough, the incarnate God spent His days quietly, a man who went to work, got sleepy, and lived a pedestrian life among average people. Jesus emerges from water a commoner, wet and messy haired. And suddenly the Spirit of God shows up and the deep mystery of the universe reverberates through the air: this is the Son of God, the Son the Father loves, in whom He is pleased.


