After Paul and Silas had passed through Amphipolis and Apollonia, they came to Thessalonica, where there was a synagogue of the Jews. And Paul went in, as was his custom, and on three sabbath days argued with them from the scriptures, explaining and proving that it was necessary for the Messiah to suffer and to rise from the dead, and saying, "This is the Messiah, Jesus whom I am proclaiming to you."


Some of them were persuaded and joined Paul and Silas, as did a great many of the devout Greeks and not a few of the leading women. But the Jews became jealous, and with the help of some ruffians in the marketplaces they formed a mob and set the city in an uproar. While they were searching for Paul and Silas to bring them out to the assembly, they attacked Jason's house.

When they could not find them, they dragged Jason and some believers before the city authorities, shouting, "These people who have been turning the world upside down have come here also, and Jason has entertained them as guests. They are all acting contrary to the decrees of the emperor, saying that there is another king named Jesus."




The people and the city officials were disturbed when they heard this, and after they had taken bail from Jason and the others, they let them go. That very night the believers sent Paul and Silas off to Berea; and when they arrived, they went to the Jewish synagogue.














1 Peter 2:11-12

Dr. MLK's 6 Principles of Non-Violence


- 1. Nonviolence is only for courageous people.
- 2. Nonviolence chooses love over hate.
- 3. Nonviolence holds that suffering will educate and transform.
- 4. Nonviolence believes that the universe is on the side of justice.
- 5. Nonviolence is aggressive towards problems; not people.
- 6. Nonviolence seeks to turn enemies into friends.





Does it align with the Earthly City and her bent toward pride, domination, and results in the now?


City of God

Acts 17:10-13

[Paul and Silas went from Thessalonica to Berea.] When they arrived there, they went to the Jewish synagogue. And the people of Berea were more openminded than those in Thessalonica, and they listened eagerly to Paul's message...But when some Jews in Thessalonica learned that Paul was preaching the word of God in Berea, they went there and stirred up trouble.
